TIP #24 When you dig up plants for dividing, take the opportunity to enrich the soil at the same time by incorporating compost, bone meal, aged manure or other fertilizers

TIP #25 To give tomatoes an early start in cold areas, plant seeds indoors in peat pots on April 1st.

TIP #26 Label everything you plant.



species of plants belonging to over 1,000 genera have been identified as native to California. I'd like to introduce you to one outstanding genus which avails itself to cultivation. Iris is its genus and iridaceous: Iris is its family. Thirteen species are low and spreading with relatively short erect flower stems. In Lake county we are blessed with one, Iris macrosiphon, with hues of yellow, lavender or a smokey color. All native Irises are unexcelled for dense to filtered shade situations. An abundance of viable seeds and propagation by root division allows large

under story areas to be quickly naturalized. For those of you who prefer a more exotic looking Iris much has been done to cross the Coastal Iris (I. Douglasiana) and the Redwood Iris (I. Purdyi) to develop unbelievable forms and colors. Colors that range from near red through shades of yellow and blue to violet and sometimes in mottled designs like leopard skin. No matter what your gardening situation, these beautiful orchid-like, undemanding, long lived and drought tolerant flowers will enhance your landscape. I invite you to join the national movement to explore the fascinating world of native flora and find how rewarding it is to protect, conserve and beautify while you show that you love to garden.



Civic Beautification Field Trip & Lunch


April 24, 11am

Lake Kabatin Redbud Arrangers

At the March meeting of Arrangers, I gave a handout of the mechanics chapter in the book we are reviewing. There are good hints and tricks to arrange your flowers. I stressed the setting of your arrangement like having a background, as different backgrounds change the looks and effect of the arrangement. There was a page in the book with this example, and I also had some previous cards of the same example. Some mechanics for daffodils would be to put the stems in a

straw to make them more stable. Also for daffodils if you want to put them in oasis – first open up a place with a pencil. Sometimes you need a longer stem. You can wrap another stem to it, or wrap a twig or

wire with floral tape to extend the stem. One mechanic I had never seen before was with the aspidistra leaf, the long green ones. The tip was to tape a wire on the back so you could bend it in a wave, curl, twist or whatever. There was a picture in the book of this effect. Mechanics is a big part of arranging.








