Gentle Warrior



It was mid-spring and I was exploring the 20 acres that I had recently purchased when suddenly I came upon a band

of Indian Warriors standing at attention with their feet firmly planted in clusters of fern-like pale green or bronze leaves. These crimson red warriors appeared to be guarding an area of partial shade extending into full sun. They were sheltered by chaparral--particularly manzanitas. Later I was to find that they are semi-parasitic and prosper by borrowing from their neighbors. I have since shared my home with many of these handsome warriors. As in the wild, they appear happiest when sheltered by manzanitas. To satisfy their cultural needs I probe until I locate a shallow root of the manzanita and place the young 'warrior to be' so that contact with the host is easily accomplished. The "warriors to be" are harvested from the wild just as their tender foliage breaks ground in early spring When once established they reproduce by underground stems although seedlings are not uncommon. These California Indian Warriors (pedicularis densifora) over the centuries have been trained to survive and prosper on lean rations and little water. I challenge you to explore the fascinating world of California native flora and find how rewarding it is to protect, conserve and beautify while you show that you love to garden.



Hint #15

How to overwinter tropicals (like taro or cannas):



- 1) Wait until the first frost kills top growth,
- 2) Cut stems back to 6 inches,
- 3) dig up bulbs, tubers, & corms of plants,
- 4) Wash off all soil & dry them for a few hours,
- 5) Wrap them individually in newspaper & place in an opaque plastic bag,
- 6) Store in dry, dark place (40°F to 70°F)
