Humble because this stately California native prefers the remote dry canyons of Southern California where it might have remained shy and hidden had it not been for exploring English botanists who took root cuttings back to England where it became, not only a member of the royal family, but a universal favorite. When given the royal treatment, care must be taken to restrict its rampant behavior. Although it can be controlled in small gardens, it does best in large scale landscapes.

'Matilija Poppy'. Would you like to know

how its name came about? There was a conflict when the Spaniards built their mission in Chumash Indian territory where the town of Buena Ventura now stands. The Chumash chief's daughter, Amatil, fell in love with a Spanish soldier guarding the mission. She became an outcast to her people. A Chumash warrior who had been in love with Amatil was ordered to slay her Spanish lover and bring her home. His success was her tragedy. As he carried her by horse back to the mountains of the Ojai along the base of the Ventura hills the tears she shed would blossom into magnificent reminders of an Indian maiden who died of a broken hear. Her father, Chumash Chief Matilija, forgave her and gave them his name in her honor.






