Oct Program: Decorate Mini Pumpkins--October 20th, 10:30 AM

We will decorate mini pumpkins with natural materials such as dried flowers, leaves, cones, acorns, and seedpods. Tendrils from grapes or any vine or curled florist wire add a nice touch. You will need to bring to the workshop a mini pumpkin(s), decorative materials, scissors and fast drying glue. Additional decorating materials will be available along with a couple of hot glue guns.

"Carol, is it too late to disbud my mums to get bigger blooms for our show on the 13th of November? And what about aphids? What is a good natural spray for them? I don't want to use commercial toxic sprays." "For disbudding, it's best to do this as soon as the buds have formed. Place your thumb on the bud and roll it off. It will come disconnected from the flower head. Take all the buds off but the center one. All the nutrients will now go to the one flower. To treat for aphids, white flies and spider mites, first hose off your plant, let dry for an hour. Use a mixture of 1 cup Wesson oil, 1 cup water and 1 tsp dish soap which has been shaken thoroughly. Spray on your plants. It works every time."

Library Notes: Each month the library cart is rolled out and occasionally members will browse the shelves to see if anything catches their interest. There is always much to do before the meeting begins and often the library cart sits by its lonely self in the corner of the clubhouse.

Many of the books on the shelves were donated by members dating back to the 60's and 70's mostly. I even found a flower arranging book with a copyright date of 1945! Delightful to look through and I'm sure many of the same principles apply today.

Since our workshop for October's meeting will be making decorative pumpkins with Betty Atwood Reyna, I looked for a book in our library which would go along with our creative efforts. I found <u>Making Gifts from oddments and Outdoor Materials</u>, by Betsey Creekmore. The purpose of her book is to 'put something of yourself in the gifts you give'. She tells you how to create gifts using dried flowers, pinecones, pressed flowers, leaves and much more. How about hollowing out a small fresh pumpkin and filling it with cut chrysanthemums and colorful fall foliage?

There is also a chapter about herbs and seasonings. Here's a tip—instead of packaging each dried herb separately, combine some into 'fines herbs' which is a mixture of four herbs in equal proportions. For example, thyme, basil, savory and chives are great in an omelet. Basil, thyme, sweet marjoram and parsley mixed with softened butter makes a delicious spread for breads.

Next time I'll share highlights form some more recently published books I highly recommend for any gardener's library.

The Gentle Giant (Quercus lobata)



It had once been the Valley of the Giants. Giants that stood as much as 120 feet tall with bodies 9 feet thick and limbs that could reach out as much as 52 feet. During a life time, spanning as much a 499 years, protection was provided by a thick white-gray scaly skin broken into broad flat plates. These giants thrived in silt filled valleys and drank from old subterranean lake beds. "Sod busters" competing for fertile soil removed thousands of these gentle giants and after finding their hard, fine grained brittle tissue was not durable nor of commercial value used it to fuel their stoves and fireplaces. As a young boy I was given the task of sawing a fallen limb into firewood. The chain saw hadn't made the scene and only "girl boys" wore gloves. Two weeks and two swollen bloody blistered hands later the job was done. Moist brittle tissue coupled with lightning strikes and hot summer days resulted in a supply of large fallen

limbs for Grandma's cook stove and the large old sand stone slab fireplace. Although these huge tent-like giants were used for shade, the limbs never overhung the farm house-for obvious reasons. Spring time! Each of these giants is clothed in a new highly textured green suit that is discarded before winter revealing its stout gnarly and twisted frame - a sculpture to behold. Adding to its beauty is the formation of thousands of tiny "gems" with which it reproduces the species and feeds a multitude of animals. With bucketfuls of these "gems" I helped Grandpa Jay fatten many a hog in the fall of the year. This "KING OF THE OAKS" has a number of common names but California or Valley White oak seems the most fitting.

Wouldn't one be truly honored to have one of these long lived monumental giants planted in their memory.
