


CGCI e-NEWSLETTER:

BUTTERFLIES: Butterfly populations are declining more and more these days. You can help by supplying plants for their larva and for their food source. Larval plants include: Milkweed, ceanothus, common buckeye, wild buckwheat, common fennel, penstemon, willow, and spiraea. Nectar plants include: Yarrow, aster, marigold, butterfly bush, morning glory, lantana, lavender, Shasta daisy, catmint, oregano, salvia, pincushion, some of the sedums, goldenrod, and verbena. Never use pesticides in your garden. Have a water source for them along with a sunny location for them to perch. Choose a wide variety of plants to create a long blooming time

THERE'S HAIR IN MY SOAP!

Hi Jim, remember me, Jerry Shaul. We went to East Lake Grammar School together. Yes Jerry, I remember you. You invited me and Calvin to your birthday party. Jim and Calvin Brown were members of the Pomo Indian Elem

Tribe. Jim Brown had just given a talk to the rotary club regarding the problem of alcoholism amongst the Pomo people. It had been 35 years since that "memorable" Birthday party. I remembered that the Browns, Jim, Calvin and Pracilla had introduced me to the soaproot plant (chlorogalum Pomeridianum). Our school was located next to a native plant community which included the soaproot plant. The Browns insisted on using the soaproot plant to wash up and Jim had given our class a talk about the soaproot plant and its uses by his people. We watched Jim dig up the bottle shaped bulb which was covered by course brown hair-like fibers. We each made a brush by binding these fibers to a stick which we used to clean the inside of our desks. He told us how his people also used these fibers to make "sleeping bags". After removing the

"hair" he showed us how to crush the bulb for use as soap. Besides cleaning the skin it can be used as a hair wash curing scalp disorders and leaving the hair soft and glossy. Since it has no alkali it can also be used to wash silk and other delicate fabrics. He told us how they used this plant to stupefy fish in pools and streams. The bulbs were mashed and thrown in pools where fish were known to be. Soon sluggish fish would appear and were gathered up before they recovered from the effects of the chemical 'sapotoxin'. The soaproot plant is easily identified by the radial tuft of flaccid strap-like leaves, and nearly leafless, paniculately branching stem 2 to 6 feet high. It was March and the season to pluck the young stems. Those of us who dared tasted the roasted stems that Jim had prepared and found them as sweet as sugar. I have hundreds of these plants on my property and at dusk find each array of delicate star-like flowers most beautiful and mystifying.
