Tip Toeing Through The Tulips

Josephine, our attempt to remove PG&E from our lives in the areas of heating and cooling our home has worked out fine. However our typical winter bill of 60-70 dollars skyrockets to 120 -140 dollars during the summer months. Since we cool our home without PG&E's help the 60-70 dollar increase must be the result of pumping well water to irrigate our ornamental and vegetable gardens. This year that will include 'Early Girl' tomatoes, zucchini, carrots, red sweet peppers and lemon cucumbers. And now Josephine sit down for the *shocker*! These vegetables will be grown in your ornamental garden. Dispersed throughout in such a clever way that not only will they be inconspicuous but may actually enhance the beauty of your prides and joys. Oh yes, the irrigation system will remain untouched. FACTS ABOUT DAFFODILS:

Daffodils are members of the Narcissus family.

There are 13 divisions of daffodils: Trumpet Daffodils, Large-cupped, Small-cupped, Double, Triandrus, Cyclamineus, Jonquilla, Tazetta, Poeticus, Bulbocodium, Split-corona, Miscellaneous, and Species, Wild Variants and Wild Hybrids. In addition, miniature versions of each daffodil division exist.

Daffodils originated in south west Europe. There are over 25,000 varieties of daffodils and they come in yellow, white, orange and even a peach/pink shade.

All parts of the daffodil are poisonous. The sap of daffodils can be damaging to other flowers. If you've picked them to display in a vase with other flowers, then it's best to leave them in water on their own for at least 12 hours, before mixing them together.

The emblem of Wales is the daffodil. People often wear daffodils on St. David's Day. In New York, nearly 2,500,000 daffodils are grown each year. The Victorians thought daffodils acted as a symbol of regard. Prince Charles, from the British Royal Family, is annually given one daffodil to act as a form of rent for land on the Isles of Scilly.

Daffodil bulbs contain a substance called galanthine, which has medicinal properties. In fact, it's sometimes used in treatments for Alzheimer's.


