## How to Make Seed Tape

### Materials Needed:

- \* toilet paper (paper towels & napkins also work)
- \* Ruler
- \* Marker
- \* All-purpose glue
- \* Tweezers (optional)
- \* Seeds
- \* Toiler-paper or paper-towel tube



- 1) Measure out a length of toilet paper. (cut length-wise if planting narrow row)
- 2) Consult the packet of seeds to find out how far apart the seeds should be planted, then mark at each spot on the towel where a seed will go.
- 3) Dab a bit of water-soluble glue on each mark.
- 4) Pour the seeds out onto a plate, and spread them

around a little. Using tweezers, pick up a seed and place it on one of the drops of glue. Continue placing seeds on all the glue drops.

5) Once all the seeds are placed and the glue has dried, you can roll the seed tape onto a toilet paper roll & store in a cool, dry place until you are ready to plant. If the garden or containers are ready, plant immediately.

6) To plant, lay the seed tape on the soil surface, weighting it here and there to keep the wind from moving it. Cover with garden soil or compost to the depth recommended on the seed packet—for fine seeds, that can be as little as 1/4 inch of soil. Firm the soil to make sure there is good soil-seed contact. Water with a fine nozzle to avoid washing the soil away and keep moist.

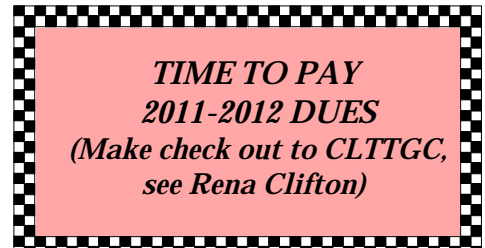

## Beauty and the Beast

Well Josephine let's grab a cup of java and, as promised, take our garden club friends on a journey through our outdoor retreat. Let's ignore the brick, aggregate, and other man made features that have their place but must be separated from while blending with the natural areas of the landscape. The pathways that meander through the trees and shrubs are layered with weed inhibiting redwood chips which are easy to walk on, resist decay and pack together allowing the removal of leaves without significant chip removal. Pathways and no-walk areas are defined by a minimal use of boulder clumps, decaying logs and stumps and laced with bunch grasses and clumps of wild iris. Josephine let's sit a spell in your anniversary swing which hangs from a walnut tree preserved from the old orchard. The benches and swing are designed to blend with the landscape - no tubes, pipes or metal of any kind please. Let's finish our java and mosey along amongst the towering redwoods, cedars, pines and oaks. Notice how the walk ways surround island-like points of interest which contain trees as

well as under story plantings of toyon, manzanita, wild lilac and snow berries. Spring sparkle is added to these 'islands' with plantings of native perennials such as wild iris, Indian warriors, wood hyacinths, hound's tongues and soap plants. Also included are a few exotics: daffodils, grape hyacinths and winter iris. Josephine, do you notice the occasional mound covered with pine needles. Not only are they attractive but they cover the remains of Monterey pines, Japanese black pines and Austrian pines which should not be planted in Lake County. Several of our walkways follow deer fences which are hidden by 'don't fence me in' screens formed by toyons and manzanitas. The cultural needs of this type of landscaping are satisfied by rain, humus and the micro/macro critters who make their homes here. However, pruning and pathway clearing requires considerable effort. Josephine, old girl, don't just stand there let's get to work! Jerry, there you go again with that old girl stuff, "Please my dear **KNOCK IT OFF!**"

I stopped by to visit Carol and she pointed out a plant in her garden which was given to her by Marie Wright. (Club President, '60-'61 & '84-'86).

The name of the flower is Campanula.  
(Campanulaceae, c. glomerata)

There are about 300 species of the plant. They tend to spread indefinitely from the root. Glomerata is upright with side branches to 1-2 ft. Stem leaves are broad, toothed and somewhat hairy. Flowers are purple and tightly clustered at the top of stems. They bloom from spring through summer.

Carol has divided some of these plants and they will be available at **the plant sale on May 7th.**

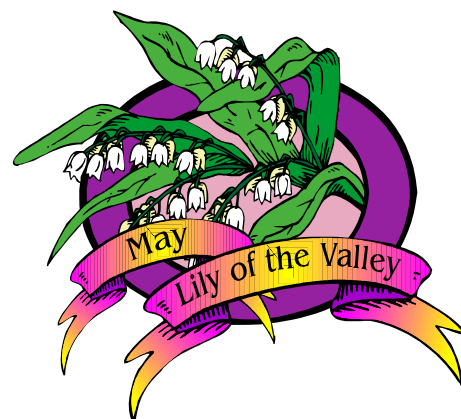
