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Dear Dahlia.

Q: Leanne asks, "How can you tell the difference between lemon balm and mint?



A: Lemon Balm (Melissa officinalis) can be an invasive perennial herb, like its cousin, mint (menthe). An intense fragrant scent of lemons occurs when the leaves are bruised or crushed. It has clusters of insignificant pale creamy flowers in summer, and mid-green, oval, toothed textured

leaves. It is a hardy herb that dies back in winter and reappears in the spring. Propagate from seed or root divisions. Use leaves in drinks, fruit cups, salads, or with fish.

Mum Cuttings: The best time to get cuttings from Mums is in the fall. Take some of the healthy slightly woody part of the plant and strip off the bottom leaves. I usually plan to put about 4 inches of stripped stem under the soil. Dip the stem in a rooting hormone and plant as you would a potted plant. You can also put your cutting in a pot that has potting soil and use a stick to make a hole in the potting soil and stick your cutting with the root toner gently in the prepared pot and push dirt around it and then water. DO NOT leave much green on the top. A couple healthy leaves are plenty. You want all your plant's energy to go toward developing strong roots. I keep my plants in the shade for a couple weeks to let the process start. This works for **boxwood** too! Leanne Harvey

FEATURED PLANT-Chrysanthemum

Mums are Carol Kesey's favorite flower. They grow will in Lake County and Bloom when the day's sunlight shortens to the appropriate length. Garden Club members hope it coincides with the 'Mum Show', Nov 9th this year. They are



wonderful to share with friends and the variety is amazing!

Growing Tips:

- Some are easy to grow. Some are difficult.
- Be ready to stake and tie to prevent plants from breaking & bending when the blooms come.
- Monitor plants carefully and watch for aphids. If aphids appear. Wash the plant with a spray of water. After the plant dries, use 1 cup water, 1 cup oil and 2 tablespoons of dish soap and give them a good spraying. Check and dose as often as aphids reappear.
- Mums love fertilizer!
- Mulch to discourage weeds and to keep the ground moisture constant.
- You can get your mums to bloom sooner if in August you keep them in the dark from 5 P.M. to 8 A.M. every day for about a month. This fools the plant into thinking it is later in the season than it is and the buds form early.
- The best time to get a cutting is in the fall. Prune:
- Pinch tips of leaves early in the growing season frequently to keep young plants compact and bushy. Cut the plants back in July to about 6 inches. But staking is needed for plants that have the big, showy blooms and for plants to do well in the Lake County Fall weather
- Plants like some space. 12-24 inches is recommended. When you share with friends, it will be good for your mums.

Remove faded blooms regularly to keep mums blooming longer

Propagate:

- Plants can be propagated by seed, cuttings or plant division
- Make a name tag for each plant so you'll know if it is a tall, medium, or short growing plant. Aluminum pans cut in pieces work well for this as do Venetian blinds.

Sow seeds in early spring. With a seed, you may get a completely different plant as a bee may have had its way with multiple partners. I recommend cuttings and plant division in the late fall or early spring if you want to really know what plant you are getting and growing.

Flora fun, friends! Tips from the President

Watering 101: Three scenarios

• The "Impatient" Gardener sprinkles the top of the dirt until it all looks wet. Problem: The roots are way down deep, and they get no water and might die of thirst.

• The Aggressive "Let's Get this Done Now!" Gardener uses his hose like a light saber tearing up the soil around the roots and damaging them. Problem: The roots get wet down below, but the roots close to the surface are damaged and the plant suffers

The Organized, Successful, Green Thumb
Gardener uses drip irrigation for most outside
plants. We get our plants watered deeply and
gently conserving water. Timers are great for
this as they can be adjusted over the seasons
to give the plants just what they need. The
plants that don't have drippers get a deep ring
of dirt around each plant, and we fill that maybe
more than once depending on the size and
needs of the plants. We water using a wand
that doesn't tear up the dirt. We don't water
right on the base of the plant but in the 'well'.
No problems!

Should I water all my plants like this? As the dental hygienist tells us about flossing...

"Only the ones you want to keep."

(Exceptions to rules do occur: Cactus and some others).

Eureka! A living Christmas tree. With its gracefully curved branches that are tastefully "painted" golden or grey-green "frosted" at the tips by new growth retains its pyramidal shape throughout its life. Planted in a 5-gallon container this beauty can be further decorated at

Christmas time and also used as a patio ornamental over a period of 5 to 10 years. Then it may be transplanted in a park-like landscape where a pleasing contrast with surrounding vegetation is desired. Poor soil and rainfall only will allow up to 3-ft. per year growth up to 80 ft.

with a 40 ft. spread. This pest and disease free tree seems to adjust its habit so as to find comfort within the space allotted and co-exists well with close neighbors. For decades this native of the Indian Himalayas has been grown in California as an ornamental. "Deodar", its Hindu name means "timber of the gods".

Doug Schmidt takes samples from a costal oak tree believed to have been killed by Sudden Oak Death in Golden Gate Park The disease has spread throughout the Bay Area. Phytophthora ramorum is the cause of both Sud-



den Oak Death, a forest disease that has resulted in widespread dieback of several tree species in California and Oregon forests, and Ramorum blight, which affects the leaves and twigs of numerous other plants in forests and nurseries.
