

Dear Dahlia,

Q: "Do you deadhead roses in the fall?" asks Ginny Cline.



A: The experts at the Russian River Rose Company have helped Dear Dahlia with questions about roses. It takes about 6 weeks for new buds to develop and bloom on your roses. So go ahead and deadhead until about the end of September in most of Lake County, but after that

you can spend your garden time better doing something else in the garden. You won't get more blooms. If you are right on the lake or your roses are protected from the frosty elements...just count the weeks and don't bother after you believe the first frost will be 6 weeks in the future.

FEATURED PLANT-IRIS

Growing Tips:

- •Iris love sunlight and humus-rich soil that's well drained (except special ones like the Japanese Iris that loves water.)
- Plant in full sun
- •The rhizomes like to be very close to the surface. Do not plant deep. Do not mulch as the rhizomes do not like to be wet constantly.
- •Point the leaves in the direction you want the plant
- •They like to be fertilized with bone meal and garden fertilizer.

Prune:

- ·After flowers have shriveled, pick off the deadheads and cut spent stems so the energy goes back into the rhizome rather than into seed production.
- If you do want to fertilize iris using a paintbrush to try to get an iris with a ruffled petal, for example, on your favorite colored iris, you can get good results. Let the seed pod form, and plant it where you can observe the changes. You have to be patient, but some good results can occur. (Ask Leanne for details, if interested.)
- August is ideal for cutting the leaves back to about three-5 inches from the ground. You can push this up to October in Lake County if you have just been too busy to make it happen in August and September. So this is your very last chance for this season! Go right outside and get to it. The "mother" part of the rhizome will not bloom again - though she may produce babies that will grow and flower.

Propagate:

In the fall, you can divide the rhizomes by cutting or breaking them into section making sure each section has a fan of leaves. This should be done about every three years so they continue to have plenty of room to bloom and grow. If you have less energy, take your shovel and give them a good hit severing the old part from the new growth and your results will be pretty good.

Note: Some varieties are available now that bloom twice a YEAR! The Earl of Essex is

a twice a year bloomer.

If you have named iris, you can write the name in permanent marker on the center leaf of the fan.

Then when the colony flourishes, you can share with a friend.

Since I (Leanne) am farther away from the lake than Carol K and it's a bit colder, I sent an email to Kings Mums regarding getting mums to bloom right at the right time for our mum show. I think I'm about 2 weeks behind Carol who lives closer to the lake. From: Kings Mums [mailto:mums@kingsmums.com] Mum Words from the experts: Many growers in areas subject to early cold weather start covering with black cloth on August 1st to get blooms ahead of their normal blooming time. The darkness needs to be accomplished with black cloth or black plastic so that they have less than 10 foot candles of light on the growing point (pretty much total darkness). They need to be covered every night at 5 and uncovered every morning at 8 for about a month. That will cause the plant to think it is late enough in the fall to set buds, and will give you blooms about a month earlier. You can set up a light weight frame over your plants and just pull the black cloth over at night.


Mum "TO DO" LIST

Be sure your mums are staked and tied up so the weight of the plant and the developing flowers will not cause the plant to fall and break.

ROCKS, POSTS, and High Places (Sceloporus Occidentalis) Jerry Shaul



Josephine, I say to you with profound pride that we share our yard with members of the squamata-Iquanidae-phrynosomatidae ssp sceloporus-occidentalis and let it be said "that's a mouthful". After a season of keeping our landscape free of insects and spiders these

little creatures (3-4 inches) find a shelter protected from predators and freezing where they hibernate until the spring warm-up. Being 'cold blooded', they rely on sunning themselves on rocks, fence posts and other high places which make them an easy target for predation like snakes, birds, cats and dogs. Their only defenses are fast reflexes and a tail that is easily disconnected after which it wiggles thus diverting the predator's attention. In a short time another tail is re-grown. Interesting mating rituals are performed by Mr. Blue Belly and Miss Liz in the spring. Females lay one to three clutches of 3 to 17 eggs (usually 8) between April and July which are covered in warm soil where they hatch in August. Predation reduces the possibility of over population. One interesting study has shown that Lyme disease is lower in areas inhabited by S. Occidentalis. It is common for ticks carrying Lyme disease to feed on their blood. A protein in their blood kills the bacterium responsible for Lyme disease. The ticks' blood is cleansed and no longer carries Lyme disease. Josephine, did you hear that truck go by on its way to your son's. It's the third time this year that he's had his place sprayed with insecticides. No bugs, no Western Fence Lizards, and who knows the negative affects on soil macro and micro organisms, insect eating birds and the neurological systems in the human body. Josephine, would you fetch our canes so that we can hobble through the yard on a Western Fence Lizard sighting adventure.
