


All members who donated gifts and daffodils are to be thanked. The guests loved those special touches. Renker Farms once again supported our club by donating some of the daffodils.

April's Featured Plant: Daylily

Daylilies are ornamental and useful too. Their buds and blooms are tasty and nutritious. Their roots and crowns are used in medicine. I haven't tried this and don't suggest it, but the juice of the roots is said to be an antidote for arsenic poisoning as well as an antidepressant. Dried foliage has been woven into footwear. (Probably bad for arch support.)

Growing tips:

- They are easy to grow in well drained garden soil in full sun
- They appreciate mulch, and all purpose fertilizer every 2-3 weeks or a time release fertilizer to save you time. You'll get more blooms longer if you fertilize religiously. Consistent watering will keep them happy.

Prune:

 Deadhead flowers when bloom is over to promote foliage growth. After all blooms are spent, remove the stems so all the energy goes into the plant and not into seed production. It makes your garden look tidy, too.

Propagate:

 Dig and separate every three years. Fall is a good time to do this after they have finished their blooming. Survival rate should be very good. Share your plants or replant them in a different sunny location.

Q: I started a mum cutting in December and, sadly, it didn't make it. Any ideas why it failed to thrive?

A: Dear Baffled

If you start a cutting or even a new plant in the cold weather, it can de-

velop a mold in the stem that causes it to die. Here is a hint for the next time. Try keeping the soil warm in the house or with a warming pad so the mold can't start, & you'll have great luck.

For any CLTTGC member that tried a start that didn't live, you are in luck. New shoots are coming up in Leanne's mum garden, and she would welcome members with trowels and gentle hands!



CANDIED CITRUS RINDS



For the Daffodil Tea I used whole oranges, sliced them and put them to boil. Usually I peel Texas Ruby Red Grapefruit, or large Oranges.

- Peel fruit, in quarters, and boil for 15 minutes or more, several times, rinsing with cold water each time.
- Syrup of 4 cups sugar and 2 cups water. Put drained peel in syrup and boil 45 minutes, then add large package of Jell-O. (Orange Jell-O for oranges, Lemon Jell-O for grapefruit)
- Boil another 15 minutes or longer, cooking down is good, but watch so will not stick burn.
- Drain on rack, after half a day or so, cut into strips, then roll in sugar. Let sit another day. and maybe sugar again.

The orange slices are the most fragile.

Note: Candied Orange Peel and Grapefruit have been at the Christmas House from the beginning. My cousin worked for Sunkist, and was always sending us oranges, we would even make fresh orange juice. I noticed the recipe in the Better Homes and Gardens Cookies and Candies Book, 1966, and made some. The extra ingredient here is the Jell-O. I would take this as a treat, and people would say, you ought to sell this! I found that boiling, and rinsing in cold water helps to take out any bitterness. With the grapefruit, the pink ones are better. Sometimes, even to let them soak overnight in-between 'boils' is good. Leaving the peel in quarters also makes for easier handling and damage during the boiling. Be prepared for a little mess.

Store in the freezer, they are a good keeper. Serve with Lemon Lift Tea!




