Rooting Geraniums



1. Take a healthy stem to get a better quality plant. 2. Cut a 4-6 inch stem at a 45 degree angle just below a node.

3. Remove the leaves around the bottom as well as any flowers or buds leaving only one or two on top so the new cutting can concentrate on growing roots.

4. Let the stems "harden" for a few hours. 5. Dip the slightly moistened stem in rooting hormone such as Schultz Take Root. Tap off any excess as too much is not a good thing! 6. Use a soil-less mixture such as sphagnum peat or perlite or a mixture of 2/3 sphagnum and 1/3 perlite. Be sure to moisten the mixture before you put it in the pot so it absorbs the water. Heide says warm water helps absorption. 7. Place cuttings in a Ziploc bag punctured with holes and place in a light room, but not direct

sunlight. Lightly mist cuttings and make sure they don't dry out.

8. You'll know the plant has formed roots if you gently tug the stem and it resists! I've found this takes 4-6 weeks.

9. Transplant into a larger pot & watch it grow.

Q: How do I get rid of voles? from Frustrated with their munching (Debbie Riley via Leslie Jones) A: Dear Frustrated

Join the club! Voles, sometimes known as meadow mice, resemble mice but they have a stouter body, a

shorter hairier tail, a slightly rounder head, smaller ears and eyes. Those little rodents cause us all to lose plants.

Management by habitat modification: You can reduce the area from which voles can invade gardens or landscaped areas by regularly mowing, spraying with herbicides, grazing, or tilling grassy areas along ditch banks, right-ofways, or field edges adjacent to gardens. If feasible, weed-free strips can serve as buffers around areas requiring protection. The wider the cleared strip, the less apt voles will be to cross and become established in gardens. A minimum width of 15 feet is recommended, but even that can be ineffective when vole numbers are high. A 4-foot-diameter circle around the base of young trees or vines that is free of vegetation or a buffer strip 4 feet or more along a row of trees can reduce problems, because voles prefer not to feed in the open. Trapping and baiting can also be effective methods in controlling your vole problem. Voles carry human diseases so handle carefully. More information can be found at

March Tips from the President

Decorating a cake? With the back of a spoon gently "paint" melted white or dark chocolate on the most textured side of camellia leaves. Pop them in the refrigerator for a few minutes and then gently peal the leaf off. Be sure to wash and dry the leaves before you begin.

Think outside the norm for outside pots to plant in. Supplies:

Take that old rusty Hibachi. Clean it up a bit, and then use coffee filter(s) to prevent the soil from falling through the air vents at the bottom. Add soil and plant a small herb garden. It can be moved inside the garage if we get a heavy freeze in Lake County.

March's Featured Plant: Azalea Azaleas give a burst of color to your garden during it blooming season. They grow easily on the coast and a trip in the spring is well worth the cost of gas. In Lake County, we have a tougher time growing them, but it's worth the extra effort.

Growing Tips: Azaleas and Rhododendrons



are acid loving plants with shallow roots. They can be planted on a mound of rich, humus filled soil. Plant on the east side of your house in most areas in Lake County. Do not plant too deep. They like plenty of mulch. Think about the floor of a redwood forest

Prune:

- They do not need pruning, but if you need to prune, do it right after they have finished blooming.
- Remove oldest stems every three years
- The smaller leafed azaleas do not tolerate pruning as well as the larger leafed plants tolerate it.

Propagate:

- Seeds can be sowed in pans of sandy peat moss and then covered with sphagnum moss.
- Cuttings of half-ripe wood, scratched at the • stem and treated with growth hormone can produce a new plant. They are a bit tricky.
- For patient gardeners: If a stem is close to the ground, you can scratch the stem and bend it to the ground, treat it with root hormone. Then cover it with soil, and it should root right there and you can move it later.
