THYME WITH PRESIDENT DANA

November brings in the parade of Holidays most celebrated by Americans. This is a time of busy hustle and thinking about decorating our homes and gardens. Gardening is closely linked to our Christmas Trees, Wreaths, Floral Arrangements, and Home Decorations. Bringing the garden inside the home happens in the Winter! We can use the beautiful greenery in our gardens to make almost any kind of wreath. A bouquet of Rose Hips is one of my favorite and most spectacular achievements in floral arranging. Try it!



November is also a very colorful month with the changing of the season, and Fall beauty is all around us. Our deciduous trees turn lovely shades of goldens and reds and then lose their leaves taking a long winter's rest. This is a time to clean up the garden and start preparing for the new growth that will return in the Spring.

Color plays a big part in putting the overall atmosphere together inside the home. Color is also very important in the Garden. Sight is typically the initial, or even the primary way we experience a landscape. This is an element so very important in Landscape Design for our gardens also. The Color Wheel is the basis of combining colors so they complement, focus our attention and shape or define our space in the Garden and also inside our homes. Warm, bright colors advance or move toward you and draw attention to an area. Good colors to achieve this are Red, Orange, or Yellow. Cool, dark colors recede or move away from you. Good colors to achieve this are Blue, Green, and Violet. The color wheel can be found in almost any art supply store and is often in a Landscape Design Book. A quick review follows:

There are 3 Primary Colors: Red, Yellow, Blue

There are 3 Secondary Colors: Orange, Green, Violet

There are 6 **Tertiary Colors:** Red-Orange, Yellow-Orange, Yellow-Green, Blue-Green, Blue-Violet, Red-Violet

<u>Complimentary</u> Colors-which are opposite on the color wheel are: Yellow/ Violet, Red/Green, Orange/Blue. They are extremely eye-catching.

<u>Harmonious Colors</u>- which are adjacent on the color wheel blend well together. Other terms to know are: <u>Hue</u>-undiluted Color, <u>Tint</u>-a color mixed with white, <u>Shade</u>-a color mixed with black, <u>Tone</u>-a color mixed with grey, <u>Monochromatic</u> colors- combinations of tints, shades, or tones of the same color which can be harmonious and calming.

I hope this is helpful to you when decorating with greens and flowers inside your home during the Holiday Season this winter, or Landscaping and planting in your outdoor gardens! Happy Thanksgiving!



Technically, Harry Lauder's walking stick may be classi-

fied as a deciduous flowering shrub, produced by grafting. But because the rootstock in the graft provides a 4'-high trunk, this multistemmed bush is com-



monly referred to as a dwarf tree. This shrub reaches approximately 10 feet tall, but it is slow to reach its mature height. Its spread can be as much as half again its height. The showy flowers are yellowish-brown male *catkins*.

The Harry Lauder's walking stick grows best in USDA plant hardiness zones 4-8. It has average watering needs and likes well-drained soil, in full sun to part shade. Fertilize the plant with compost. Being a grafted shrub, it does require some special care. The rootstock is *Corylus colurna*, you must prune off any suckers so that the plant does not revert to the characteristics of its rootstock.



MENDOCINO BOTANICAL GARDENS Mushroom Fest Mushroom Walk! Monday, November 7 at 1:30pm MCBG Staff Mycologist Mario Abreu



Join us for an extra special Mushroom Walk in celebration of the <u>Mushroom, Wine, and Beer Festival</u>! The Gardens is home to more than 150 species of mushrooms during fall and winter on the Mendocino Coast. <u>Mushrooms</u> are the fruiting bodies of some types of fungi. Normally hidden underground, these reproductive structures lie dormant until the rainy season, when they sprout above the earth. We consider mushrooms to be one of our collections, and we are the only botanical garden in the U.S. to label the mushrooms in our garden with both scientific and common names.

<u>They will be holding mushroom</u> <u>identification walks</u> <u>each Monday</u> November 21 through December 19.
