THYME WITH PRESIDENT DANA

February is my favorite month of the year! Weather usually teases us with a promise of Spring that will soon be here! I love Daphne, and it graces us with it's wonderful aroma, that is mixed with the damp rains!

This month we will discuss the continuation of the History of Landscape Design in Western Civilization. As we become familiar with the history of Landscape Design, observe all garden's,



and try to identify the influences we have covered. It is a fun game to play! **Greece**: In Greece, the idea of container gardens emerged because city houses were small, irrigation was expensive and a luxury, and the grounds crowded. An ideal garden had an orchard, a vineyard, and a hedge garden for floral display with a central fountain, and often contained sculptures.

Rome: Romans are known for their urban design and spatial organization. The "Forum Romanum" was a large open public space in the center of Rome and was the hub of the Roman Empire. The construction of the Appian Way in 312 A.D. was a system to tie distant provinces closer to Rome. City gardens were enclosed within the house in an open court surrounded by columns (called peristyle). Topiaries were first used and horticultural experts debuted. Statuary was also prominent in Roman gardens with a mythical theme.

Italy: Italian gardens introduced formal gardens using mathematical formulas of numbers and groupings. Hillside villas, with the use of gravity, was introduced to furnish water to fountains, water cascades, and pools. Town squares were introduced.

France: Paris became the model of civic design for the entire world in the nine-teenth century. Radial avenues, parks, wide boulevards, and a grand canal, made it so beautiful.

Netherlands: Garden sizes were limited and land was reclaimed from the sea, making trees difficult to grow. "Tulipmania" was prevalent. Topiaries were prevalent and fine turf was used for areas for lawn bowling.

England: Tudor knot gardens, a series of entwined planting of clipped boxwood hedges, created an interwoven pattern set between pathways with stones or flowers to add color. The formal garden became obsolete and were replaced with irregular, asymmetrical designs resembling Oriental garden designs. The English Landscape Gardening School was born in 1713. The naturalistic design was more sustainable and less expensive to maintain. World Wars signaled the decline of garden-making on a grand scale as the labor force went off to war.
