Tips Regarding Your Spring Gardens

May is here! Spring is the most beautiful time of year! After so much rain through the winter months, weeds are a big problem. Two techniques to conquer the weed problem are: Save all your cardboard and put it down and cover with chips. This will eliminate the weeds. Another trick is to use your newspapers underneath your chips or mulch. The weeds will not grow without sun.



When planning your vegetable garden, don't forget that the frost season is over in Lake County on May 15th. This is not a guarantee, and a surprise frost can appear unexpectedly well into June. Cover your newly planted vegetable gardens if the temperature goes below 32 degrees. Straw is also a technique you can use to cover tender, young plantings and protect them from cold nights in late spring. This also adds mulch to the garden area and keeps weeds to a minimum.

If you don't have a sprinkler system in place, you can use soaker hoses to water through the summer months. They are reasonably priced and can be arranged easily on the garden plot. If you have leaking or dripping hose bibs, purchase adapters and you can turn off the adapter and stop the leak. They are reasonably priced at the local hardware store.

Don't forget netting to protect your fruit trees and vegetable gardens from birds that will help themselves to the rewards of your efforts!

As far as gophers are concerned, good luck! The best defense is to plant in gopher baskets to protect roots. Planting in pots also work well to protect your flowers from the gophers. I have a plant in my garden that is a gopher plant. It is quite prolific, and it seems to work. Wherever it grows the gophers will stay away. I don't know the technical name of the "Gopher Plant" as my mother gave me the start and it is now all over the garden.

I hope some of these tips make your gardening experience more pleasurable! The good weather to come will be a welcome change!



In 2003, when Sharon Thorne was our President, I was Birds/Butterfly Chair and invited Louise Hallberg to speak and show slides at our meeting. Our garden club also visited her Hallberg Butterfly Garden in Graton. Hallberg's mother planted a native Dutchman's Pipe in the 1920s.

The vine is the only plant the Pipevine Swallowtail Butterfly nests. Today more than 40 species are in her garden. She is one of American's leading lepidopterist. Louise created a nonprofit and over the years she personally greeted more than 35,000 people even into her 99th year. She died this year (2017) at an age of 100 years.
