THYME WITH PRESIDENT DANA

October is the month of pumpkins and Halloween! When we think of October and Fall we automatically think pumpkins, which are ripening for pumpkin carving and pie making. Halloween hales in the string of holidays that will follow for the rest of 2017. Halloween is one of my favorite holidays because there are no expectations.

Pumpkins are one of the most colorful and multi-useful fruits that are grown in Lake County. This delightful and fun fruit is a member of genus Cucurbita and is thought to have originated in South America. This fruit is related to squash, gourds, and melons. Pumpkins come in many different varieties and for Halloween, "Atlantic Giant" is a good choice for your garden. For that Pumpkin Pie, "Small Sugar" is the pumpkin to grow. For decorations, use "Jack Be Little" and your table will pop with color and outshine all others!

Pumpkins need a lot of room to grow, with rich soil and lots of water. If you are growing that giant pumpkin for your festive holidays make sure you fertilize regularly. Always keep leaves dry when watering as this will prevent leaf disease. It is wise to shove a shingle or cardboard under the pumpkins to keep them dry and free of rot. It takes from 90 to 120 days to grow pumpkins and it is fun to have many different varieties as well as various colors in your garden. Pumpkins are best harvested after the first frost after the plant dies back.

Once established, pumpkins grow at a very rapid rate and this is why we think of magic, when pumpkins are in the garden! Pumpkins were first carved and lit up with candles in early days to frighten away evil spirits. This tradition has caught on and we still carve away every October.

I hope your October gardening and holiday, Halloween, are one of the best! I have included a recipe for Pumpkin Ravioli's, a family tradition!

SWAP TABLE: Leanne has set up a table for us to bring items to trade. Any donations to the club are gladly accepted, but optional.


STATE AWARDS: First Place for our Yearbook, Third Place for our Press book and we were awarded the Blue Ribbon Certificate of Achievement.

THE TINIEST TERRORS: VIRUSES:

BACKYARD PROBLEM SOLVER, JERRY BAKER

Do you know what it looks like when plants get the flu? Plants infected with viruses don't sneeze or suffer stopped-up noses. Instead, new growth becomes distorted, leaves show odd textures and colors, and plants that are supposed to grow tall look short and stunted.

Unlike fungi, viruses can't blow around in the wind or be carried from place to place in droplets of rainwater. They must have a live host, usually an insect which spreads the virus from plant to plant as it feeds. Leafhoppers, aphids, and thrips are the usual culprits, and it takes only one little bite to infect a susceptible plant with a virus.

Chrysanthemum aphids are a tough little breed. They are poised to do some serious damage to the pretty fall flowers you've been waiting for all summer. Use a pyrethrin-bases insecticide to knock them out.

Recipes

PUMPKIN MUFFINS *Dana DiRicco-Benjamin*

400 Degrees

12 – 15 Minutes

Makes Approximately 14 Cupcakes

½ C Butter (1 C applesauce can be substituted)

¾ C Dark Brown Sugar

1/3 C Molasses

1 Egg Beaten

1 C Canned Pumpkin (or Roast a fresh pumpkin and process)

1 ½ C Flour

¼ C Quaker Oats

¼ t salt

1 T Baking Soda

1 ½ T Ground Cinnamon

1 T Nutmeg

1 T Ground Ginger (dried candies ginger can be substituted)

¼ C Currants or Raisins

Raw Sugar (for topping)

Add eggs, Quaker Oats & Pumpkin; Sift flour, salt, Baking Soda, Cinnamon, Nutmeg, & Ginger; Fold in raisins and currants. Spoon into cupcake papers ¾ full. Sprinkle top with raw sugar and Quaker Oats. Bake.

PUMPKIN PIE SPICE

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1/2 tsp ground allspice

1/2 tsp ground ginger

1/4 tsp ground nutmeg

PEAR CUSTARD PIE

Nancy Benkelman

4 pears— peeled, cored and cut into 1/8's

Juice of a 1/2 lemon

1 tsp vanilla

1 cup sugar

1/4 cup flour

3 eggs

1/4 cup butter or margarine

1 9"-pie crust — uncooked (store bought, Pillsbury brand is a good one)

1) Preheat oven to 350 degrees

2) Brush pear slices with lemon juice

3) Melt butter and set aside — let it cool off enough so it won't cook the eggs.

4) Blend eggs — don't beat!

In a bowl, create custard: combine sugar, flour, eggs, butter, and vanilla. Stir until blended.

Pour into pie shell. Arrange pear sliced on top of custard — push them in a little. Bake 45 minutes or until custard is firm — check occasionally to see if foil is needed to prevent burning. Cool.



Shredded Butternut Squash with Dates and Pistachios

1 medium butternut squash (1 ½ pounds)

2 medium shallots

1/3 cup shelled natural pistachios

3 large dates

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

Kosher salt

4 large mint leaves

1 to 1 ½ tablespoons fresh lemon juice

Cayenne pepper

Peel the butternut squash and cut it into pieces that will fit into the feed tube of a food processor. Fit the processor with the coarse shredding disc and shred the squash (about 3 ½ cups). Finely chop the shallots (about 1/3 cups); coarsely chop the pistachios (about 1/3 cup); and pit & coarsely chop the dates (about ¼ cup).

Heat the vegetable oil in a large skillet over medium heat until hot. Add the shallots and cook for 1 minute, stirring. Add the butternut squash and a hefty pinch of salt, turn up the heat to medium-high, and cook for 3 minutes, stirring, until the squash is tender. The mixture will become soft, like a puree. Shred the mint (about 2 teaspoons). Stir in the pistachios, dates, mint, and lemon juice. Add salt and cayenne to taste.

Quick reminder for mum growers. The need to disbud your mums may be upon you. I started yesterday.

"Disbudding" means to keep the biggest middle bud and take away all the little ones around it so you'll have big blooms. So, it's like thinning your pear or apple tree's multiple fruit on one branch, so you get the big fruit instead of a bunch of little pieces of fruit.

Also, a check for aphids is a good thing to do now... I was surprised when I went out to look yesterday and there were the voracious little creatures chomping away... **Leanne Harvey**

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
